Once connected to the CRC, individuals are referred to Resiliency Navigators who work closely to learn their individual needs, develop a personalized plan, and make gains towards recovery and resiliency.

EMERGENCY FOOD & SHELTER PROGRAM

The Emergency Food & Shelter Program (EFSP) supports those experiencing hunger and homelessness throughout the El Paso community.

United Way of El Paso County administers and facilitates EFSP with a local jurisdiction board to assist organizations and essential programs offering provisions and housing to those most in need.

In the 2024-25 fiscal year, EFSP distributed **\$442,988 to 10 local agencies.**


